



THE RECORD

A General Review 1965 to 1972

by the Headmaster

In the General Review covering the years 1957 to 1964 I spelt out in some detail our aims at West Downs. It is sufficient here to say that they are 1) to treat each boy as an individual and help him to develop his interests and talents; 2) to teach him how to live in a community of other boys and how to behave towards grown-ups; 3) to enable him to pass into the Public School of his parents' choice.

These are simple objectives but they demand a measure of resolution in the face of the winds of change in educational theory. On the third point, for example, we continue to have examinations, weekly marks and reports and other spurs and checks, relying on the competitive instinct of most boys to achieve results rather than a thirst for knowledge. This is anathema to the devotees of the Nouvelle Vague which emphasises the value of projects by which boys learn for themselves in being exposed to the world around them. We teach, on the assumption that a great many boys are allergic to academic work and do not yet know where their consuming interests lie. Similarly, on the second point, clearly it is at present unfashionable to proclaim that we teach Behaviour, based of course on that of a committed Christian.

INSPECTIONS

This leads naturally to what Her Majesty's Inspectors think of us. During the period under review we have had a full Inspection in 1965 and a visitation in 1970. The full report was generally laudatory. Unfortunately I cannot quote from it since it is expressly directed that 'If published, it must be published in its entirety'. It is available, in its entirety, for anyone who is interested. The Chief Inspector who came in 1970 was mainly interested in one subject only, French, and his comments on its teaching were vitiated by his ignorance of the requirements of the Public Schools. 'The standard of Scholarship French is very high and very traditional in content'. This is a truism from his report and we have to teach boys, therefore, to write in French. Have you tried it yourselves? It is a very difficult exercise. It is an easy language to speak fluently and badly; a very hard one to master academically. The Visitation, like the Inspection, emphasised the importance of In-Training, a topic which happens to be topical because of the James Report. We have done something about this. During the period under review Masters on the West Downs Staff have been to over 20 Conferences of shorter or longer duration in Science,

Mathematics, Scripture, English, French, and Specific Reading Disabilities (formerly known as Dyslexia). In Mathematics, particularly, we are well abreast of the latest developments, whose source is the University of Southampton, which is so near at hand. Our Senior Mathematics Master has been on nine courses during the last five years, at Oxford, London and Southampton Universities and three Public Schools. We are in touch with the Cambridge Latin Project, and aware of the trend of opinion over the teaching of History and Geography.

FEES

In January 1965 the termly fee was £120 and it is now £200 plus £4-50 until such time as the Government finally liquidates the Selective Employment Tax, which (for the benefit of readers of this account in the far future) was and is a poll-tax specially weighted against the service industries on which we depend for our invisible exports, such as Insurance and Banks and the Tourist Industry. This is a 60% increase and my bill for wages and salaries has gone up by a greater percentage. Schoolmasters are still underpaid, since they are reluctant to strike, and since they seek higher financial rewards from a very low base. Social historians are aware that governesses sold themselves a hundred years ago for twenty guineas a year, the price even then of a well-bred dog. What is not so well known is that even in 1954, when I first came to West Downs, a full-time teacher was getting as little as £230 a year and the maximum was £600. It is inevitable that there will be further increases in fees in future so that the teaching profession should get its due.

NUMBERS

During the period the number of boys at West Downs increased from about 125 to about 150. In actual fact the number of boys at West Downs in January 1965 was 119 and the number in January 1972 was 148. (It usually happens that there are fewer boys in the Easter Term because a lot of boys leave their Public Schools in December and many parents prefer their sons to start their Boarding Prep. School life in April rather than in January). Provision had to be made for the extra 25 boys. In consequence —

- (1) A Dormitory for 19 boys was built overlooking the field; Field Dormitory.
- (2) Two classrooms were built, with a prospect on to the so-called Private Garden.
- (3) The former Kitchen Garden became a playing field, named after a master who had just retired, Rawson's Field.

(4) A flat for a married master was built in the new Dormitory Block and a Staff house, at present occupied by a married gardener, was purchased in a nearby road.

The last point may sound irrelevant, but when I came to the School in 1954 Melbury Lodge was used as Staff Quarters, the Sanni ward was unused and a wing of the School was servants' quarters. 19 boys now sleep in Melbury Lodge; the former servants' wing is a Sick Bay; and the Sanni ward has become two classrooms. The School premises are now used to the full for boys and nearly all servants sleep outside. The Staff sleeping in the School are mostly those with supervisory duties at night, like Sister and her Assistant, and Matron and her staff.

Rawson's Field, the former Kitchen Garden, is now of course an integral part of the play area and so the private enclosure has ceased to exist. There are permanent cricket nets between Rawson's Field and the Squash Court, with a Boat House nearby. A Toy Boat Pool and a Putting Course lie along a strip of ground linking the grass tennis court with the hard court. The Private Garden is now used by the boys for croquet. The only part left for exclusive grown-up use is the Memorial Garden.

CAPITAL INJECTION

About £25,000 has been spent during the seven year period on the above mentioned Capital works and on the following: - the installation of gas-fired boilers for the central heating of the Sick Bay, the West Wing of the main School, and in the Scullery; gas heaters in the Sanni classrooms, three giant Sadia electric water heaters in Melbury Lodge, the main School, and Field Dormitory, and electric storage heaters; the asphalting of the drives; the construction of an attic bedroom, store-room and additional bathroom on the Private side; the conversion of the N rooms into a Science and Art Room; the provision of further Fire-proof doors, fire-escapes, and fire-fighting equipment to meet the requirements of the Authorities; and the construction of an Orchestra Room and seven piano Practice rooms, with help from those who subscribed to the Lionel Helbert Centenary Fund. Clearly these varied capital works could not have been carried out for £25,000 if they had all been put out to contract, but we now have a maintenance staff of four and they have done quite a lot of it. One of them does nothing but painting, and during the period all the classrooms, staff rooms in the main School, and the Melbury rooms have been re-decorated, and Melbury Lodge and a good part of the main School have been painted outside. Much more remains to be done and it is our policy to finance these capital improvements from fees and letting in the holidays. The Helbert Centenary Appeal was a special case. There will be no general Appeal to the sentimental attachment of Old Boys to their former

School. A school, like any other private enterprise, should be viable and should not depend for its existence on the generosity of benefactors.

HERE AM I, SEND ME

In 1967 the publication 'Where' listed West Downs among the Hundred Best Schools, with only five other Boarding Prep. Schools.

As will be apparent in later articles in this Record, we try to be outward-looking; to be aware of the needs of others; to be of service where we can. Mr. H. V. Hodson expressed this well when he gave us ten Gold Medals in 1968, as a tribute to our ideal of service, the Award to be given each year at the Headmaster's discretion to the boy who, in his opinion, had given special service to other people either in the School or elsewhere. Winners of the Medal so far have been E. G. G. Lambert, the Hon. G. S. Monck, and D. W. Townshend. It is difficult for boys of Prep. School age to do social service of the kind which is now common at Public Schools. We tried visiting an Old Peoples' Home for a time but it did not really work. It seems preferable to channel the desire of many boys to serve both in help over running the School and in special efforts like Carol-singing round the town for Shelter.

Staff

In January 1965 the Assistant Masters at the School were: - R. Severn (who took over as Second Master from D. Howell Griffith), H. F. R. Rawson, M. Hinds, J. J. Fisher, Lt-Cmdr. G. L. Eddis, H. J. Salwey, C. G. M. Morrison, J. S. Fitzgerald, J. C. Chasney, and H. N. A. Brigstocke. The ladies of the Teaching Staff at that time were Miss M. E. Richardson, Mdle. V. Carrere and Miss S. M. Spencer. The Physical Training Instructor was H. Risbridger.

In January 1972 the Staff consisted of:-R. Severn, J. J. Fisher, Lt-Cmdr. G. L. Eddis, Captn. R. C. Austin, C. G. M. Morrison, C. J. I. Maxse, J. S. Fitzgerald, A. S. Bartlett, Major R. Moss, S. T. Eason, Miss M. E. Richardson, Mdle. V. Carrere, Mrs. G. E. Severn, Mrs. J. K. Fitzgerald, Mrs. M. M. Temple and, part-time, Mrs. C. Phelips and Mrs. S. M. Taylor.

Mr. Hugh Rawson retired in 1966 after teaching for about 70 terms at West Downs. His service was divided into three parts, each longer than the other. As a very young man he taught for a short time under Lionel Helbert between leaving Westminster and going up to Cambridge where he was a Wrangler. In his salad days he returned to teach at West Downs under Helbert and Kenneth Tindall in the early twenties, and found his wife here in the person of Thelwyn Price. They married and left to run a school of their own which was one of the casualties of the Second World War. So for the third time he returned to do about 60

terms hard labour with K.B.T. and me. He had been an eminent athlete in his youth and played Cricket and Tennis well when he was nearing 70. He now lives quietly with his daughter near Reading.

Mr. Marcus Hinds retired in 1969 after doing 38 terms. Before that he was at Victoria College in Egypt. Nasser may have given back to the Egyptians their dignity, making them feel that they were men with a great history behind them, but he did not give Marcus back the property he took from him. Marcus ran our Sports for many years, and started Tennis coaching at West Downs. He tried to conceal his love for boys by his bark, but they saw through it. He now lives with his sister in Sussex and visits us from time to time.

Miss Susan Spencer was with us for 19 terms and she is specially remembered for helping with Tennis Coaching, singing in the Choir and acting and assisting with plays, as well as for teaching French and German and taking Lower School II. She is now Mrs. Harward, married to a Schoolmaster in a nearby Prep. School, and she has a son.

Cmdr. Eric Back came and went during the period, staying with us for 10 terms. Like so many Second World War sailors his health was broken by being on the Northern run when he had to guard the merchant ships taking supplies to Russia. He raised the status of Geography in the curriculum and also taught Maths. He now lives in retirement at Havant with his wife and family, doing a little private coaching.

Mr. Humphrey Salwey was a permanent member of our Staff for 5 terms only, after being Headmaster of the Pilgrims School in Winchester for 97 terms. He is still with us part-time, helping boys who are backward in Latin. He has only just retired from presiding over the City Bench and has an honorary post at the Cathedral. He is one of our main links with the City.

Mr. J. C. Chasney was at West Downs for 7 terms, Mr. M. Jacob for 4, and Hugh Brigstocke, Tristram Jenkins, Ian Wright, Mark Perowne, Tim Russ, Christopher Martin and Bruce Pilsworth for shorter periods. Brigstocke, Jenkins and Martin were O.W.D.s and Tris Jenkins has stayed in the teaching profession, at a Comprehensive School.

Miss Anna Ruszkowska taught Lower School II for 4 terms before emigrating to Cyprus; she is now married. Miss Eularia Clarke, well-known locally for her religious paintings, retired from teaching Art at West Downs and has since died. Miss Kate Bickmore was the School Secretary for nearly three years during the period and we still see her occasionally when she comes South.

Finally, Mr. Dempster, our Head Maintenance man and Carpentry teacher had to retire due to ill-health after seven and a half years here, and Mr. Harry Risbridger has at last given up the teaching of gym,

shooting, fencing, and boxing, but he is still on the strength part-time, teaching carpentry to the boys and helping with Swimming instruction. So visiting O.W.D.s will continue to have the opportunity to listen to his stories of old, forgotten, far off things and battles long ago.

Work

Owing to the larger numbers there are now 12 Forms, the statistical average number in each being $12\frac{1}{2}$. Forms vary in size between 10 and 15 maximum.

During the period under review every West Downs boy succeeded in getting into the Public School of his parents' choice. Two boys failed for Eton at the first attempt but they got in at the second and incidentally both of them did so well that they now have University places. The Schools to which the boys went are listed in the next article.

There have been big changes in Common Entrance requirements during the period. Under the new dispensation English, Maths and French are the main Common Entrance subjects, but boys must also offer History, Geography, Science and Scripture (unless they are non-Christians). These last four are called Compulsory supporting subjects. Latin and Greek are optional subjects but nearly all the Schools to which West Downs boys go still demand Latin. Certain Public Schools do now accept boys who do not offer Latin, but it is usually a matter of negotiating with the Public School Headmaster in each case as to whether he will take a boy who does not offer it. Winchester still has a separate Entrance Exam. which has changed to fall into line with the new Common Entrance rubric, but, as before, it is of a higher standard and Latin is compulsory. The Common Entrance Science syllabus is quite extensive (see below) and room for it has to be found in the Timetable for the higher Forms. In consequence the senior boys now do per week 7 periods of Maths; 6 of English; 6 of French; 6 Latin; 3 Science; 2 History; 2 Geography and 1 Scripture. Gym, Art and Singing have been edged out and have to be done in a boy's free time. A few boys right at the top of the School do Greek. One of the almost insuperable difficulties of this change of emphasis is that a knowledge of Latin and Greek to a very high standard is still demanded in Public School Scholarship examinations.

Particulars about individual subjects are as under:-

Science — taught on the lines of the Nuffield Scheme, is now, as I said, a compulsory supporting subject. It is a two-year course, the idea being that all boys can take their 'O' levels in Physics, Chemistry and Biology after another two years at their Public School, as they can in other subjects. There is a Biology room where toads, locusts,

axolotls, worms and stick insects lead incubated lives, in the company of an occasional hamster pet. A visiting teacher, Mrs. Shirley Hundleby, is in charge. The Physics syllabus covers Electricity, Levers, Molecular Theory, Energy Charges and Crystals. The Chemistry syllabus includes Elements and their re-activity, Chromotography, Acids and Alkalis and Combustion.

English – now has a higher status in the scheme of things. This reform is certainly due. It is to be hoped that as a result there will be less illiteracy and more interest in the magic of words in future. There is less emphasis on grammar and more on comprehension. The aim is to encourage boys to express themselves on paper and in speaking.

French — has traditionally been spoken by the English, and even perhaps by other United Kingdom citizens, after the school of Stratford-atte-Bowe. The Common Entrance Board has tried very hard to eradicate this and failed. There is now a French Oral test in C.E. but no Public School takes the slightest notice of it since it is almost impossible to compare the performance of boys from different Prep. schools. It is, however, to the good that French is now taken more seriously and we are fortunate at West Downs in having two French ladies to teach it. They should know their own language, especially since the French, unlike the English, believe (rightly in my opinion) in la Civilisation Francaise. This includes a belief in their language which we have never had in ours. Who has ever heard of Pidgin French? The new style French examination is certainly more difficult than the old, because it includes a dictée as well as such things as definitions.

Mathematics - The present Common Entrance papers are all the New Maths, meaning that Algebra is introduced much earlier and Geometrical concepts are presented in more tangible form. Problems are more practical and there is less laborious computation. The boys prefer it.

Latin – no longer has a special status. There is more translation and less composition. The papers are easier in some respects, but boys now have to answer questions on Roman History and Greek Mythology as well as understanding the language and we have to fit this also into our crowded syllabus.

In History – boys can now study the period 1485 to 1945 and do not need to know anything about earlier times. But Winchester and scholarship candidates still have to cover the whole of English History.

The Geography – syllabus has also been narrowed to cover certain areas of the world rather than the whole lot, but here again we find no relief in this since the boys have to know these areas more thoroughly.

In Scripture – there is now more emphasis on the New Testament than the Old and boys are expected to know the meanings of the parables.

There are further complications in store.

First, German. Clearly this will be an essential language when we enter the European Community. The question is when it should first be learned. At present boys start on it at Public School, whereas they learn French at Prep. School, and in my opinion there is no valid educational reason for this. It seems clear that within the next seven years German instead of Latin will be an optional subject in the Common Entrance (and Winchester Entrance) and we are geared to make the change. Second, Dyslexia or, as I prefer it, Specific Reading Disabilities (S.R.D. for short). We have increasingly found that some boys come here unable to read. It is not worthwhile to apportion the blame for this; we must just accept it. Again we are aware and abreast of the problem. We propose to take practical steps to meet and defeat it.

In effect we serve 17 schools only and nearly a third, actually 32%, went on to Eton. 16% went to Winchester, whereas in the period 1954 to 1964, 23% went there. Comparing this with the previous list, whereas Charterhouse, Harrow, Wellington and Rugby have more or less held their positions below Eton and Winchester, there was a sharp decline in the popularity of Marlborough among West Downs parents and an equally sharp rise in that of Radley. Milton Abbey, Westminster and Bryanston appear for the first time with two or more against them.

Chapel

Boys at West Downs are taught to believe that Jesus is God as a person, that, by his sacrifice, He atoned for all our sins and that if we trust in Him we can conquer all our difficulties. This is my personal belief and why I continue the tradition of teaching about a hundred boys, usually straight from the Bible, in Chapel. The bottom four Forms are taught in two lots in the Classrooms.

We are fortunate in that part of our property lies within the Parish of the only Evangelical Church in the area. Its congregation was distressingly small until Canon Gordon Guinness came from Bournemouth. Immediately he arrived I started the practice of the School going to Christ Church on the first Sunday of each term. He has now retired, but his successor, the Rev. Jeffrey Watson, is continuing his good work; last time we went there was standing room only. We have helped in a practical way towards financial provision for a curate, the Rev. John Page, who teaches Scripture to two lower Forms and who has also taught some French here. We greatly value our association with a thriving Church in the town.

We have tried to keep the Chapel Services alive by varying the form of worship. During the period under review innovations have been as under:-

- (1) A Harvest Festival Service at which Masters and Boys read poems and prose works as well as Bible passages, praising and thanking God for all created things.
- (2) A Saint Cecilia's Day Service in gratitude for all who have helped us to know more of God through the gift of music.
- (3) A Service run by the boys once each term, built round a theme such as extracts from the Miracle on the River Kwai in which the prisoners learned to forgive the Japanese, or a Television Interview of Mary Magdalene extracted from the Davidson Affair.
- (4) A Discussion Service once every term when the Head of the Theology Department at King Alfred's Teacher Training College answers questions from the boys.

Thus, since there are 33 Sundays in the year when we are at School, there are 11 special morning Services including those at Christ Church, and 22 ordinary ones with a sermon. In general terms we have visiting Preachers on 18 of these Sundays and I preach on the other 6. Regular Preachers each term are the Prison Chaplain and the Christ Church Curate; many of the visitors are laymen such as parents of boys in the School, who are serving officers, on Remembrance Sunday and lay helpers in Christ Church and Oxford undergraduates who are friends of my son Andrew. Among the more eminent Preachers were the Bishop of Winchester, the Principal of St. Swithuns (the local Girls' School), the Minister of the Winchester Methodist Church, the Chaplain-General of H. M. Prisons, the Rev. John Eddison who, saving His Grace and Their Eminences, is in my opinion the best Preacher to Prep. School boys in All England.

We abandoned the WAIF during the period, largely because Government regulations made him invisible, on the ground that we might patronise him, and we adopted instead a School in Malaya, St. Gabriel's, at Kuala Lumpur. We can at least hear them on tape. We send contributions to them each year for the purchase of books, writing materials and sports equipment. They send us stamps, photographs, and peculiar objects such as a wicker ball which must be kept off the ground by a group of players (we have not yet mastered the technique). Any O.W.D. visitors to Kuala Lumpur are assured of an overwhelming welcome.

Miss Glover, whose other achievements are recorded elsewhere in this Record, has completely changed the status and standard of the Choir. Inadequately rewarded by an annual Choir Outing to a film and Blow-Out, the boys and masters sing an Anthem every Sunday in four parts, and the Carol Service no longer follows the well-worn lines. Variations on the theme of God in person being born on earth have been the Shelter

Service based on no room in the Inn, and an International Service highlighting the brotherhood of all Christians, thinking specially of those courageous souls behind the Iron Curtain. Some folk songs, like those used in the Festival of Light, are also sometimes sung in Chapel, a particular favourite being the tune to 'The King of Love'.

The Organ, given to the School many years ago by Arthur Broadhurst O.W.D., had to undergo a serious operation. Her inside was taken out and she has been completely re-wired, a costly business in which I was greatly helped by generous donations from a parent and two Old Boys.

In the teaching of Scripture I have been greatly helped by my son Andrew and by ideas which were aired at two Conferences on Religious Education which I have attended. In general I now emphasise more the relevance of the Christian Message to actual every day situations and to modern times and explain more fully the meanings of Old Testament Parables like the story of the Garden of Eden, and the parables and sayings of Jesus.

Scouting

In 1966 a Working Party, which included an O.W.D., produced a report which proposed fundamental changes in the Scout Movement. Its recommendations were adopted and came into effect within the next two years. The very name of the Movement was changed, the word 'Boy' being dropped. The uniform was changed. More important for us, the tests for Scouts were made more difficult, since the age range was changed from 11 to 14, to 11 to 16. Before this revolution nearly all West Downs boys became Second Class Scouts before they left and a few got their First Class; for instance we had 4 in 1964. Now the Advanced Scout standard, which corresponds to the old First Class, is a very difficult target for our boys and even the Scout standard, which corresponds to the old Second Class, is quite hard to get, since 15 tests, including such things as Clouds and Weather and local knowledge, have to be passed. As a result less than half the Scouts at West Downs at present get their Scout Standard before they leave.

Another change has been in the Scout Proficiency Badges. Here again the tests have been made harder, since the boys taking them throughout the country, and indeed, throughout the world, are generally older, and in many cases the instructors need to be professionals. Badges like Weatherman and Starman for which amateurs could instruct have disappeared. You need a professional Photographer to instruct for the Photography Badge, and an Electrician to instruct for Electronics. This has rather cramped our style, though during the period boys have obtained Photography and Electronics badges, instructed by outside experts, and we regularly get Ambulance Badges, the Instructor being

a St. John's Ambulance Officer. We are not complaining. Obviously the changes were needed to modernise the Movement as a whole. But it is inevitable that Prep. School Troops will not hold as many badges as they used to in the old days.

One of the ideas behind the New Look in Scouting is that all Troops should take more interest in their town or village and in the environment generally. We have tried to improve over this. In 1967 an Athletic Meeting for all Troops in the Winchester District was held at West Downs and it has continued each year ever since. We have twice won the Cup and been Runners-up another year. In 1969 a similar six-a-side Football Competition was inaugurated, again on our fields, and it has gone on. We have never won this Cup. The traditional Baker-Wilbraham Competition is held down at Melbury each year and we have been 2nd four times, and only once in the seven years lower than 3rd. Always a bridesmaid, never the blushing bride!

Nine boys camped for a weekend in 1971 with the 7th Winchester Troop, which serves the Stanmore Housing Estate, when Lord Maclean paid his last visit to Hampshire as Chief Scout. We were among the thousand Scouts in a camp at Broadlands, and met Lord Mountbatten as well. "It was a grand sight as the Chief Scout choppered away to look round on the gaiety and order of the encampment, no litter and no regimentation, a perfect Youth Festival."

One of the tests for the Scout Standard is camping out for a night and cooking supper and breakfast, so Melbury Dell is in constant use for this purpose during the last few weeks of the Summer Term and in late September. It is now surrounded on all sides by the new Hospital buildings and architect built houses to the East and North-East, but it remains as it always has been, a romantic glen full of secret camps and treasured hidey-holes in the middle of a City.

Music, Art & Crafts

In January 1965 we had 34 boys learning the Piano, one learning the Violin, two the Guitar, and seventeen the Recorder. None of them had passed any Music exams. In January 1972 there were 44 pianists, 8 violinists, 5 clarinetists, 3 'cellists, 2 learning the trumpet and 1 each the Flute, the Trombone and the Tympani. So nowadays nearly half the boys in the School learn an instrument of some kind. Many of them sit for exams. set by the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music. It all started when Miss Glover became Director of Music in 1966. It was a gradual build-up to a crescendo in 1969. Figures of Associated Board passes are -3 in 1966, 8 in 1967, 45 in 1968, 74 in 1969, 52 in 1970, and 38 in 1971. The diminuendo in the last two years

is attributable simply to the fact that there happen to be fewer boys who are musically gifted at present here. No doubt we will get up to the 1969 figure again in some future year. Boys have passed the exams. up to the following standard: Theory of Music, Grade VI; Piano, Clarinet and Oboe, Grade V; Violin, 'Cello, Flute, Trumpet and Singing, Grade IV; French Horn, Grade III. In 1969 a boy won a Musical Exhibition to Winchester.

It has been an uphill struggle to secure the services of good teachers for all these instruments, but Miss Glover has been equal to it. When Mr. Knight, the Brass teacher, had to give up due to pressure of demand from the State schools, she persuaded the Bandmaster of the Royal Green Jackets to take his place. Mr. Taylor, the Woodwind teacher, has been impressed into also becoming the Conductor of the School Orchestra. When Miss Fulcher, who had taught the violin for years at West Downs, had to retire, Miss Glover got Mrs. Meadows to take over. Mrs. Graty, who is very well known in local musical circles, teaches the 'Cello and Miss Nicoll, our Singing teacher, and Mrs. Woodman help over the teaching of the pianists. Now that we have an orchestra room and 7 adjoining piano practice rooms, the problem of storage space for instruments and music has been solved.

Mention has been made earlier of the Choir singing in Chapel. Their most ambitious work has been from the 'Messiah' and the 'Creation'. In recent Easter Term Concerts boys have performed 'Turkish Delight', an opera based on Mozart's 'Il Seraglio' and Miss Glover's 'Truthful Elf'. The next production will be 'Trial by Jury'. There have also been performances by a toy orchestra as well as the School Orchestra.

Mrs. Smith has been in charge of Art since Mrs. Clarke retired in 1967. She has introduced a great deal of variety into the programme, making use of collage techniques. A boy is sitting for the Bryanston Art Scholarship in the near future.

Mr. Risbridger has been in charge of the Crafts for most of the period and a few boys get a great deal of enjoyment from inlay work and basket-making. Mr. Severn has directed the model aircraft making for a Scout badge.

Drama and Indoor Amusements

I can never hope to emulate the open-air Shakespeare plays produced by Kenneth Tindall. But a lot of boys still get their first experience of acting at West Downs. In 1965 no boys acted but the Staff put on a Revue and Play. In 1966 there was a School Production of 'Treasure Island' with songs from 'The Sound of Music' and dance routines; 64 boys were in the cast. There was no production in 1967 and 1968 saw

ever since. Three Saturday evenings are set aside for them and on each evening three forms enact a half-hour play. So boys in the top nine forms act each year in the Easter Term and those in the tenth form, two from bottom, perform Mrs. Cornes' Nativity Play just before Christmas. Over a hundred boys get the experience of acting each year. There is no scenery and no curtain, but stage-lighting and intelligent use of the balcony in Shakespeare make up for that. It would be tedious to list the 36 productions during the years 1968 to 1971 inclusive, but among the most successful have been: - The Bottom scenes from 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'; the Mufti scene from 'Le Bourgois Gentilhomme'; Ian Hay's The Crimson Coconut'; Mr. Fitzgerald's plays based on the 'Canterville Ghost' and D. H. Lawrence's story 'The Rocking Horse Winner'; my wife's plays about the myths of Perseus and Theseus and the Minotaur; a shortened version of 'Pinocchio'; W. W. Jacob's 'The Ghost of Jerry Bundler'; Mr. Bartlett's adaptations of scenes from Ben Jonson's 'Alchemist' and his plays based on incidents in 'The Cloister and the Hearth' and 'The Three Musketeers'; a shortened version of 'Androcles and the Lion'. There have also been very modern B.B.C. plays like 'Escapade'; plays based on childrens' stories and legends like 'Beauty and the Beast', 'Little Red Riding Hood', 'Alfred and the Cakes' and 'Robin Hood', and a play written by the boys themselves. Plenty of variety and a chance for many boys to reveal their talents.

the start of the Form Plays. They have continued each Easter term

The School Debating Society, known as the Ledgard Society, has held over a hundred meetings during the period. Every Christmas term there is Standing Up when the boys recite poems and prose works.

Chess, Bridge, Scottish dancing, Monopoly, Subbuteo and Melly Tank races have their hours of glory and then, as mysteriously as it began, the craze is over. There are films or an entertainment such as the visit of a conjurer on most Saturday evenings in the Winter terms. The colour television, which we got just over a year ago for Shakespeare, makes all the difference to viewing. Football matches, all-in wrestling and the Sunday afternoon film are particularly popular.

Expeditions and Parties

West Downs boys get around. We are lucky in having four theatres within easy coaching distance at Southampton, Salisbury, Farnham, and Chichester. Opera and Ballet companies come to Southampton and Bournemouth. There is an Oratorio at Winchester Cathedral each year. So, during the seven years, parties from West Downs have been to the following:-

Shakespeare Productions - 'As You Like It' twice; (once in the open air at Wardour Castle); 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' twice. also

once at Wardour; 'The Taming of the Shrew' twice; 'Hamlet' twice; 'Much Ado About Nothing'; 'Twelfth Night'; 'The Tempest'; Julius Caesar'; 'Macbeth'.

Other Plays - 'She Stoops to Conquer' twice; 'The Rivals'; St. Joan; 'The Owl and the Pussy Cat'; two puppet shows; and a Christmas show for children.

Gilbert & Sullivan - 'The Gondoliers' twice; 'Pinafore' and 'Trial by Jury' twice; 'The Mikado'; 'Iolanthe'; 'The Yeomen of the Guard'; 'Princess Ida'.

Opera & Ballet - 'The Italian Girl in Algiers'; 'Aida'; 'The Barber of Seville!; 'Coppelia'; the Royal Festival Ballet; the Ballet Rimbaud; the Nutcracker Suite ballet.

Oratorios - 'The Messiah' twice; 'The Dream of Gerontius'; the 'Matthew Passion'; the Brahms 'Requiem'; 'The Creation'; the B. Minor Mass.

Miscellaneous - The local Scout Gang Show; Fishbourne Roman Villa, 3 times; the Vienna Boys' Choir twice; the Royal Tournament; the Tidworth Horse Show; the Winston Churchill Training Ship; the Head-quarters of the Ordnance Survey; the Railway Workshops at Eastleigh.

Groups of boys have also gone on many occasions to Lords, to the County Cricket Ground, and to London and Southampton to watch First Division Football matches.

We like getting around but we also enjoy our own parties. On the last day of each Christmas term there is Dancing for the older boys and games for the younger ones, and Shakespeare is now wired for sound, so Mr. Severn can compère it professionally and the music can be as loud as you like. About twenty girls from Queen's Mead and St. Swithuns come to this and about twenty of us get invited back to a Queen's Mead party. In the summer we get a lot of fun from running our own Fête on Whit Monday, with stalls, coconut shies and games in and out of the Toy Boat Pool. But the best party of all is Parents' Weekend. On the Friday there is a Mothers' Tennis Tournament and sometimes as many as three Cricket matches against the Fathers. On the Saturday, besides the serious running and jumping, there is the traditional Obstacle Race with its Maze, many races for younger brothers and sisters and, best of all, the dog races; boy and dog must finish together.

Football and Cricket

FOOTBALL

A summary of Football matches played during the seven years is as under:-

P.G.S. stands for Portsmouth Grammar School and boys in this team are under $12\frac{1}{2}$. Boys in Junior XIs are under 10 or under 9.

Out of 100 matches we won 58 and drew 13, only losing 29. These are good results, but the figures mask considerable disparities in results against different Prep. Schools. Our 1st XI is, over the years, better than 10 other Prep. Schools and worse than 3.

Curiously, because they are the same size as we are, our superiority is greatest over Pilgrims; of 14 matches played we have only lost twice and drawn once, so we are plus 9. On 11 matches played with Farleigh House we are plus 7. Figures for the other 8 schools are: - Marsh Court and Edinburgh House – both plus 5; Twyford, Oakmount and Westbury House – all three plus 3; Northaw and Little Appley – plus 2; West Hill Park – plus 1. On the debit side, Highfield and Stroud, and above all Horris Hill, are better then we are. We are minus 2 to Highfield and minus 4 to Stroud, and of the 14 matches played against Horris Hill we have only won twice and drawn twice, so we are minus 8. Most boys at West Downs are very keen on Football and the 1st XI is splendidly coached by Mr. Fitzgerald, but it will be some time before we are the equals of Horris Hill.

CRICKET

Cricket is a game played not only with bat and ball but with Time and the weather affects the results of matches much more than is the case with Football. Naturally, since the playing-time for Prep. School Cricket is only 2.30-6pm, there are many more draws. It is impossible to differentiate between a 'good' and a 'bad' draw. Definite results can only be achieved if there are special rules about time, as in the Gillette Cup. Some cricketers feel that this is not cricket as they know it and I personally sympathise with such opinions. Nevertheless we are one of the few Hampshire Prep. Schools which competes in a Knock-Out Tournament, run on Gillette Cup lines, 36 overs for each side. We compete because this Tournament is also open to

Schools in the 'State System' such as Portsmouth Grammar School and Taunton's, Southampton, provided the players are under 14. I am all for more contact with schools outside our magic circle. We have never won the Cup. Mr. Severn, the master in charge of our Cricket, is also active in the Hampshire Youth Cricket Association. He organises matches between boys in the Prep. Schools of Hampshire and boys in the Hampshire Local Authority schools. One or two of our best cricketers play each year in these matches.

Figures on the lines of those for Football for our matches against other Prep. Schools are as under:-

Out of a hundred matches we won 46%; drew 16%; and lost 38%. As compared to other schools our record is neither so bad nor so good as it is at Football. We are plus 4 up on Harcourt; plus 3 on Edinburgh House and Marsh Court; plus 2 on Westbury House; plus 1 on Twyford and Farleigh House; even with Boundary Oak and Little Appley; minus 1 with Horris Hill and Pilgrims; minus 2 with Stroud, West Hill Park and Oakmount; and minus 4 with Portsmouth Grammar School Bulldogs. These figures refer, of course, as in Football, to 1st XI matches only. What it comes to is that at Cricket we are about the same as a lot of other schools and markedly worse than the Bulldogs, whom we have only beaten once in seven matches. They correspond more nearly to a Public School Junior side like the Eton Threepenny team.

Facilities for good cricket have been improved during the period under review due to Mr. Severn's dedication. He devotes hours of his time during the Summer Term to tending the square, which is professionally treated with fertiliser and fresh soil. There are also permanent cricket nets with matting or rubber so that boys can be instructed in all weathers.

O.W.D.s will be sad to learn that we had our last matches at Football and Cricket against Eastacre in 1970. This well-known Pre-Prep. School has now closed. Many a keen player has had his first experience of the excitement of a match on their Playing Fields.

The Football and Cricket Inter-Patrol Matches at the end of the Christmas and Summer Terms are tremendously enjoyed and often unexpected heroes emerge. The spirit in which they are played is in the highest traditions, a mixture of keenness, sportsmanship and jollity.

Minor Games

The word 'minor' is used in no derogatory sense. It simply means either that boys at West Downs spend less time in the School Year playing the game or that it is a minority pursuit.

RUGGER

This game is played during the first five weeks of the Easter Term, a season when rain and snow often make the pitches unfit and when schools are sometimes in quarantine for infectious diseases. In consequence matches which have been arranged are quite often cancelled and the masters in charge of the games may be able to do little more than teach the boys the rather complicated rules. The season now builds up to the Six-A-Side Tournament organised by New Place. Teams come from as far away as Bristol and nearly all of them are from schools which play Rugger in the Christmas term as well as in the Easter term. So it is not surprising that we have never won this Tournament. We came very near to it in 1969, losing in the Final 9-3. Our record, in 1st XV or 1st XII matches against other schools, is 10 wins and 11 losses.

HOCKEY

We play this game in the second half of the Easter Term, when the weather tends to improve, and we play second XI as well as 1st XI matches, and one or two at Under 11. Our strongest opponents are Chafyn Grove. We played 38 matches during the period, winning 10; drawing 7, and losing 21. The match against the Staff is always much enjoyed.

LAWN TENNIS

This game has become much more popular recently. We only started playing matches in 1967 and now have about 7 each Summer, against girls' schools as well as Prep. schools. Sometimes they are not so much matches as friendly games. Boys from West Downs always go to the Prep. Schools Tournaments at Roehampton and Hurlingham at the beginning of the Summer holidays. The standard of play is very high and our entrants are not good enough to compete at Wimbledon on the Saturday; but our local record is good. Of 24 matches played we have won 18; drawn 4; and lost 2. Mrs. Fitzgerald helps her husband with the coaching.

SWIMMING

The highlight of this sport is the competition run by Winchester College in their magnificent pool for six Hampshire Prep. schools. We won the Cup in 1970, its first year. There have been 19 matches during the period and we have won 7, drawn 1, and lost 11.

ATHLETICS

Apart from our own Sports we compete against three other schools in a quadrangular Match, and against the other Winchester Scout troops. We also send a few boys to a Meeting of Prep. School boys held each year at Southampton. Out of 10 matches we have won 6 and lost 4.

CROSS COUNTRY

We have Cross Country matches, rather on an ad hoc basis, against one or two other schools, but not every year. Our course is an attractive one, with no plough, all on grass, on Farley Mount, about 2 miles. During the seven years we have had 9 matches, winning 4 and losing 5.

BOXING

From 1965 to 1969 we had one match each year against Chafyn Grove. Honours were even, for we each won 2 matches and one was drawn. They have now given up boxing and only a few West Downs boys box, so I doubt whether we will have any more matches.

FENCING

About 20 boys usually learn Fencing. We have had two matches, against Twyford in 1970 and 1971, and we won them both.

SQUASH

For some unknown reason Squash has never been much played at West Downs. At the height of its popularity about 20 boys used the court and it was then possible to select some kind of a team. Nowadays it is difficult to find five players who know anything about it. This in turn means that the general standard is low, as is shown by our being regularly beaten by the Queen's Mead girls, whereas we beat them at Tennis. One would expect things to be the other way round. Briefly, our Squash is about the standard of the 2nd VI of a Prep. School which takes the game seriously. Of 22 matches played during the period we have won 4 and lost 18.

GOLF

Up to half a dozen boys get instruction in Golf from the Professional at the Royal Winchester Club. We have had three friendly matches against Twyford and Farleigh House, on the short course at Twyford or on the Par Three course at Ampfield; we won one and drew two.

SAILING

Through the generosity of parents of boys in the School at the time we have acquired Wayfarer and Otter dinghies. The boys sailed at first on the Hamble but the traffic and parking problems on this popular river drove us farther away to Lee-on-Solent, where we can sail straight out to sea. 12 to 15 boys sail about once a week during the Summer Term, let's say 8 or 10 times during the season. Naturally there is a lot of competition and so we have to limit the field to older boys who are in the Second Cricket Game. Mr. and Mrs. Bartlett drive the boys down to Lee and instruct and look after them.

BEAGLING

Mr. Bartlett is one of the Whippers-in of the Aldershot Beagles. He takes a few boys out with him on Saturdays during the season. They enjoy it and those who go on to Eton often go on with it at Public School.

RIDING

Up to a dozen boys learn to ride at the local Riding School, which is at King's Worthy, usually in the Easter Term.

GYM

There is an inter-Patrol and Individual Gym. competition each Easter Term. The Winchester College Director of Physical Education has plans to start a Prep. School Gym. Competition on the lines of the successful Swimming match in the near future, and we will join in.

JUDO

We started Judo at West Downs a term ago. About 20 boys do it and they were tested in it down in the town at the City Physical Education Centre.

SHOOTING

There is an annual competition for the Shooting Shield and there are shoulder-to-shoulder matches against the Fathers and O.W.D.s. We shoot with .22 in the Summer and with air rifles in the Winter terms. Again about 20 boys show a keen interest and one of them broke the record for the Shield with 49 out of 50 in 1971.

O.W.D. Society

The past seven years have been about equally divided between the Chairmanships of Brigadier Maurice Hope and of Viscount Monck. By 1957 the former had not only exceeded his constitutional period of office by two years at the request of successive Founder's Day meetings, but had set a new standard in the amount of work done by the Chairman since he had not only made all the arrangements for the last O.W.D. dinner (1964) but had also undertaken the long and tedious task of compiling the 1957-64 Register. And here it should be said that almost all the labour needed in connection with the present edition has been supplied by the Headmaster himself, a burden which he should not be expected to shoulder on future occasions. As one who assisted to a very minor extent I would like to draw attention to three things; first the thoroughness and high standard of accuracy which characterised his work, secondly the disappointingly low proportion of O.W.D.'s (44%) who took the trouble to reply to the questionnaire sent out and thirdly the great reduction of labour required in the case of those who did.

Apart from the change of Chairman, the officers of the Society remain well-entrenched in their positions. Ted Russell has been Treasurer since the beginning, now half-a-century ago, and though ill-health has diminished his attendance at meetings, he keeps as watchful an eye as ever upon the financial aspect. As for the Secretary, he notes with surprise that he has been in office for seventeen years.

There have been no more dinners since 1964, but three most successful lunches have been held at the House of Lords, by kind arrangement of the present Chairman, a little before Christmas in 1967, 69 and 71. The first was over-subscribed in relation to the accommodation available and a ballot had to be held. A special feature was the attendance of Kenneth Tindall, and to some of us it was somewhat of a thrill to have the few short speeches that followed the meal punctuated by announcements on a loud-speaker to the effect that the Lord Chancellor was about to take his seat on the Woolsack and other reminders of what was happening upstairs. On the two later occasions the number of applications was well adapted to the size of the room and no one who wished to come had to be left out. It is proposed that these pleasant gatherings should take place in alternate years, lunch-time being obviously easier for many people than the evening.

Founder's Day has been celebrated at West Downs every year in the usual manner, but some will read with mixed feelings that Mr. Gilbert Salmon and his venerable camera have both retired. The full total of those attending has generally been between fifty and sixty, but Saturday, June 13th, 1970, being the exact centenary of Lionel Helbert's birth, was a very special occasion. Even the morning

meeting, instead of the normal ten or twelve, had a quorum of nineteen and no less than 73 O.W.D.'s were present for some part of the day.

Associated with this centenary was a special appeal which raised £2039, contributed by O.W.D.'s and past or present parents. £190 of this has been spent on a choir desk, with suitable inscription, which now forms the frontage to the seats occupied by the choir at the West end of the chapel; the remainder has made possible the construction of a Music Wing in the western courtyard of the main building, the Carpentry department having moved to a different site. There are now a number of small practice-rooms and a large one capable of holding an orchestra such the one the school now possesses. This brings West Downs into line with many other Prep Schools which have recently expanded their provision for the teaching and enjoyment of music, the enthusiasm for which continues to grow.

The ever-increasing cost of printing and posting has led to two increases in the amount paid by leaving boys to join the O.W.D. Society during the last seven years; from four to five guineas in 1966 and from the latter to £6.10 in 1970. But now that there are more than a thousand O.W.D.'s even this is not sufficient to cover the cost of postage to all of them. Consequently it was decided at a Sub-committee meeting held in September 1971 that the questionnaire asking for particulars required in connection with the forthcoming Record should also include an attempt to discover the actual demand for the Record and the other notices, about lunches etc., which are issued from time to time. The Record and Register is therefore only being sent to those who have specifically asked for it, but it is not too late to ask to be added to the list if for any reason you have not yet replied or wish to change your mind.

I have a feeling that not only is the School constantly expanding in numbers and in variety of pursuits, but that the O.W.D. Society is more active and better-informed than it used to be. Perhaps the fact that the Chairman has a boy in the School is one cause of this, but I am sure that the main one is the amazing way in which the Headmaster appears to know at least something about every boy of any generation who has been at West Downs. To him and to Mrs. Cornes we owe a great debt of gratitude both for their strong interest in the past and for their generous hospitality in the present which makes everyone feel at home.

Obituaries

THEODORA TINDALL

Theodora Tindall died peacefully in her sleep on August 14th, 1968 within three weeks of her 84th birthday. She had been married to Kenneth for 59 years, for 34 of which she was at West Downs. She was the youngest child of the Rev. W. J. Boys, Scholar of Eton and King's, Cambridge, and Kenneth met her when her father was the Vicar of Fordingbridge. Theodora read History at Newnham, Cambridge, where she also distinguished herself at hockey, being centre-half in the Cambridge Ladies' team. She taught for a time at St. Paul's Girls' School. She and Kenneth were married in August 1909 and they had four children, two sons who were both killed in 1942, and two daughters.

Of her contribution to West Downs, Kenneth wrote in a longer obituary which appeared in the Magazine of Christmas 1968 — 'I am only too conscious that such success as we had in the School was very largely due to her. Her sympathy and kindly advice to parents in many cases led to our close personal friendships with them; her ability to be kind, and at the same time firm, to one generation of new boys after another, helped them to settle down happily to the every day routine of school life or, in arrangements for a big occasion, inspired confidence in everyone who was working with her. Most memorable were the occasions when we moved from West Downs to Glenapp, from Glenapp to Blair Castle, and eventually from Blair Castle home to West Downs, then a mere shambles after occupation by U.S. troops. With calm efficiency and good temper she brought order out of chaos and so made her fellow workers feel that the impossible was possible'.

A member of the present Staff who knew Theodora very well particularly recalls her dealings with boys who were going through bad phases, for instance lying or cheating, and how she said Whatever a boy has done, it must never leave a scar'. All who knew her at West

Downs will remember how tremendously active she was in the running of the School, overseeing the Health side and the cooks and the daily women; acting as Sacristan in the Chapel over the altar-cloths, books and flowers, issuing the books and stationery, even herself washing up or using a broom in a crisis and, however lowly the task, making it seem enormous fun. 'Who sweeps a room, as for Thy laws, makes that and the action fine'.

For, above all, she was a convinced and practising Christian and in this lay her strength and influence.

W. J. TREMELLEN

Melly, famous for his unique way of taking the drudgery out of French Grammar, died in February 1966. He was an Assistant Master here from 1944 to 1961. He was a writer and a pioneer in teaching methods, which were a mixture of mnemonics and gymnastics. Years afterwards boys would come back from their Public Schools to tell him how the foundation of his teaching had enabled them to build their understanding of French securely.

His other passions were Railways, Cricket and Chess. He took boys for walks to the nearby bridges to hear and see the locomotives thundering below, before the diesel engine had taken the romance away from the Iron Road. He devised for the Fourth Game peculiar Cricket rules such as a run for 'Stopping a Fizzer' and mentions for scoring and fair umpiring and, like the late Harry Altham, he believed that Cricket was a code of life in miniature. You would be likely to play with a straight bat with your neighbour if you had learned at an early age to do so on the Lower field. He was also ingenious and versatile in starting crazes for small boys, for yoyos and pogo sticks, and he enjoyed demonstrating the power of pulleys and elastic bands, as shown by the Melly Tanks which he invented. He was a Celt with the enthusiasms and quick emotions of his race, with a wonderful understanding of what he called the jungle of the small boy's world.

He had a warrior's funeral as deserved, for his courage in the First World War and during his many illnesses was that of the epic heroes.

SIR FORDHAM FLOWER

Fordham Flower also died in 1966. He was, of course, much more famous at Stratford, for he was Chairman of the Executive Council of the Royal Shakespeare Society for 22 years, besides being Chairman of Flowers' Breweries and a Director of Whitbreads & Co. He was at one time Mayor of Stratford and DL of Warwickshire. But he was also Chairman of the O.W.D. Society from 1948 to 1955 and a faithful friend of the School. When Kenneth Tindall decided that it was time

that he handed the School over to someone else, I offered to take over. Kenneth and Theodora felt that my wife and I might be the right people but we had had no previous experience of running a School and so he wisely decided that the contract should not be signed until Sir Fordham and Lady Flower had seen us. I still well remember going to their lovely house at Stratford and their kindness to us. Their youngest son and our youngest son were later friends and exact contemporaries at West Downs. The School and the Society owes much to him.
